SL 2013-413

- The Department is required to evaluate each of the existing rules and make an initial determination from one of these three classifications:
 - Necessary with substantive public interest
 - Necessary without substantive public interest
 - Unnecessary
 - Review Process Follows 3 Steps

Review Process

- 3 Step Process
 - Step 1 Agency determination
 - Initial determination and public comment period
 - Step 2 Rules Review Commission(RRC) review
 - Reviews agency's report and makes final determination
 - Step 3 Administrative Procedure Oversight (APO) Committee consultation
 - Opportunity to review final determination before it becomes effective

Step 1-Agency's Determination

Initial Determination

- Necessary with substantive public interest
 - Received public comments within past 2 years
 - Affects property interest of regulated public
 - Agency knows or suspects of objection to the rule

Necessary without substantive public interest

- No public comment within past 2 years
- Includes rules that just identifies information (address, phone number)

Unnecessary

• Obsolete, redundant or otherwise not needed

Step 1 Continued

- Public Comment
 - For at least 60 days
 - Comments on determination and rules
 - Comments submitted on the web
- Agency reviews and responds
- Agency submits report to RRC
 - Initial determination
 - All comments received
 - Response to comments

Steps 2 and 3

- Step 2 RRC review
 - Reviews report and public comments to determine if rule has been classified correctly
 - Submits final determination report to APO Committee
- Step 3 APO consultation
 - Final determination does not become effective until APO consultation
 - Have 60 days to review

So what does this mean?

Unnecessary

- Rule will expire and be removed from code
- Necessary without substantive public interest
 - Rule will remain in effect without further action
- Necessary with substantive public interest
 - Rule shall be readopted as if it was new in accordance with APA

- An initial determination of "necessary with substantive public interest" is proposed for these 375 rules which cover the majority of the EMC's water quality programs.

Purpose & Scope

Framework for Set of Rules

- Adaptive Management & Staged Implementation
- Ongoing monitoring
- EMC updated every 5 yrs including 2025 report
- Stage I (2011- 2021)
 - Initial reductions watershed wide
 - Achieve standards in lower lake
- Stage II (2021 2036)
 - Additional reduction in upper watershed
 - Reduction objectives: 40% TN 77% TP
 - Achieve standards throughout lake by 2041

Stormwater, New Development

- Post-construction runoff meet N & P rate targets
 - 2.2 lbs/ac/yr TN .33 lbs/ac/yr TP
 - Local governments implement
- Land disturbance thresholds
 - ½ acre residential
 - 12,000 sq/ft commercial
 - Onsite treatment criteria
 - 30% of N&P onsite: <1 acre
 - 50% of N&P onsite: >1 acre
 - 30% of N&P onsite: Downtown Redevelopment

Stormwater, Existing Development

- All LGs implement load reducing activities on existing developed land
 - Stage I (Back to Baseline)
 - Stage II (% Goals)
- Stage II plan
 - Initial Plan = Stage I Level of effort (updated 5yrs)
- Timeline
 - Jan 2014* Submit Stage I Programs for Approval
 - Jan 2021 Submit Stage II Programs for Approval

Wastewater Discharge

- Reductions from Wastewater Dischargers
 - Mass limits: 3 large facilities in upper watershed
 - Stage I Allocations = 20% / 40% reduction
 - Stage II Allocations = 40% / 77% goals
 - Concentration limits: 2 lower watershed facilities
- Stage II Plan
 - Plans to meet Stage II limits by 2036
 - Can propose alternate limit of technology standards
- If extension past 2036 needed to meet Stage II
 - Submit updated plan every five years

Agriculture

Ag collectively achieves reductions

- Stage I 20% N / 40% P
- Stage II 40% N / 77% P
- Land Application Requirements
 - Ag apply at RYE N rates and P needs
 - Muni biosolids report soil test P & P loading rates
- Stage II individual buffer / exclusion
 - Conditional on non-compliance with Stage I

State & Federal

- Stormwater requirement for state & fed lands
 - New Development
 - Existing Development
- Similar to requirements for local governments
- NCDOT requirements
 - New Development
 - New DOT road projects meet buffer requirements
 - Existing Development
 - Minimum of at least 6 stormwater retrofits per year

Implementation Issues Identified

New Development

- Peak rate match requirements
- BMP treatment area "Project Area" vs "Catchment Area"
- Common Plan of Development
- Vested Rights
- Advance purchase of nutrient offset credits
- Ag Rule
 - Can project be subject to both Ag & the New D. rules ?
 - Example: Fish Farms that add impervious surface
